YOUR MONEY AT WORK: PROGRESS ON VEHICLE RESTORATIONS

Two restoration projects funded by the Friends of the Canadian War Museum are currently underway: the Canadian designed and manufactured Ram tank, and the Fordson emergency food van. The body of the Fordson has been lifted from the chassis, and the motor and drive train are being cleaned and refurbished. Our goal is to complete the mechanical components, and have the chassis reassembled and painted by 1 June 2008.

In contrast to the highly visible progress on the Fordson truck, the Ram tank restoration team must spend much effort on every nut, bolt, and component they remove from the vehicle. Their work will focus on the front hull and the turret interior for the next two months.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The decline in the number of Friends, something that gave the Executive pause last year, is being arrested, mainly due to the hard work of Mike Bedford, Chair of the Development and Services Committee, and his merry band. The reminders sent to Friends for 2008 renewals, implementation of new categories of Friends and being more proactive in reaching out to lapsed Friends all paid dividends. Now some of you are receiving gentle reminders to send in your dues. We look forward to having you stay with us so keep those cards, letters and cheques coming in.

Now our challenge is to recruit new people. To this end, we are going to tap into the historical community via academic, community and military history-oriented groups that share our interests. We aim to raise our profile among the community at large and to make our accomplishments and donations to the Museum more widely known in the coming months.

One of the responses sometimes met by Friends recruiters is the person who asks, "What's in it for me?" The correct response to that is, "That's the wrong question." At the risk of sounding too Kennedy-esque ("Ask not what your country can do for you, etc, etc"), one has to remember that the Friends are a philanthropic organization. By definition, that means we are an outgoing, giving organization and that Friends are not focused upon individual gain.

Our aim says it all: to support the Canadian War Museum. There is no mention in that simple statement of personal reward to individuals. In fact, a premise of philanthropy underpins our status as a registered charity.

Of course, being part of the Friends brings intrinsic and intangible rewards to all of us. Many come from a career of service to country. Many have a strong interest in the military history of Canada and want to see it preserved and communicated to subsequent generations. Being a member of a charity that is oriented to these broad goals of service, preservation and education is satisfying to all of us. Presumably, there are others who are not yet Friends that share these values and goals. We simply must give them the opportunity to join us.

So, what to do with the person who asks about personal return from being a Friend? Hopefully, a quick explanation like the above will suffice. But any mass communicator will tell you that it is not worthwhile to try to change perceptions that are set in concrete. Better to spend time on getting the message to someone who is seeking facts and is not dead set against your idea. And there must be many individuals, groups and businesses out there who share our concepts of charitable giving to the Canadian War Museum. Your task, each of you, is to find them and give them the chance to join us.

INTERVIEW WITH MARK O'NEILL, DG, CWM

Q: Your appointment notice indicated that you will be both Director General CWM and VP of CMCC. Does that imply that your job at CWM will be anything less than full-time?

A: No. The title reflects the importance of the Canadian War Museum, and therefore its Director General, in the wider Museum Corporation. It affirms that the Director General of the Canadian War Museum is automatically a Vice President of the Canadian Museum of Civilization Corporation.

Q: What do you see as the challenges for CWM in the immediate and medium term future? Have you any priorities to meet those challenges?

A: The new Canadian War Museum has established itself as one of the great cultural institutions of Canada. This is evident through the quality of its exhibitions, the innovation of its public programs, and the excellence of its publishing initiatives, for example. Since its opening in 2005, visitor feedback has been virtually universally positive. However, like all museums in Canada today, the Canadian War Museum must work hard to maintain and increase visitorship, continue to build a national collection, and provide more Canadians with access to the knowledge it creates and disseminates. Examples of activities include: focusing on research, developing travelling exhibitions, developing new directions in collecting, iden-

tifying new ways to reach out to Canadians (through the Internet and other means) and finding ways to make the Museum more user-friendly and increase visitor awareness on how to access it.

Q: You are not a historian by profession. Will that be a disadvantage for you?

A: I don't believe so. I am an experienced manager, having worked in museums and other related heritage institutions in Canada for over a decade, including 7 years as an Executive with the Museum Corporation. I know the Canadian War Museum, having overseen the planning of its official opening in 2005 and since then working closely on many of its projects. The Canadian War Museum's professional staff includes some of the country's finest military historians, and houses extensive national collections of primary and secondary research material which document Canada's military history. With my management team, I intend to harness these resources to a common purpose: the ongoing establishment of a world-class Canadian military history museum.

Q: The CWM has sometimes been criticized as being army-centric. How do you respond to that?

A: The Canadian War Museum is Canada's national museum of military history. Its exhibitions and programs use the human experience of war, told mainly

through the personal stories, artifacts and recollections of ordinary Canadians to engage visitors in a personal dialogue about their country, its past, and its prospects. The story and contribution of its armed forces to that history is pivotal, and certainly the army is well-represented in the Museum's collections and exhibitions. We are working to expand the representation of the Canadian Armed Forces in the Museum, including, for example, working with the Canadian Navy on 2010 – The Canadian Naval Centennial. Our future research and collecting activities will include other aspects of the Canadian Armed Forces.

Q: What is your view of the relationship between CWM Management and the Friends of the Canadian War Museum?

A: As a member of its Board of Directors, I have already attended two meetings of the FCWM and will continue to do so. I have also initiated monthly meetings with the President of the Friends which I find to be quite useful. The Friends are an important part of the Museum community; they raise critical funds, help preserve and enhance the Museum's collections, organize special events, and provide a much-needed volunteer base for a number of the Museum's activities. The Friends are a touchstone - an important link to the wider community the Museum serves.

FCWM SUPPORTS CATALOGUING OF VALUABLE MHRC RESOURCES

Thanks to the generous support of the FCWM, the Military History Research Centre (MHRC) has completed two major cataloguing projects over the last few months. Both projects have lived up to our expectations: we've discovered valuable research resources and potential exhibit material.

The first project involved organizing, cataloguing, and creating a finding aid for a recent donation of more than fifty metres of archival, photographic, and library material. The entire collection relates to the military career of Canadian BGen Clayton Beattie who played an influential role in Canadian peacekeeping. Much of the collection, which includes photo albums, Canadian newsreels, logbooks, and extensive correspondence, covers his experience as the Canadian Contingent Commander for the United Nations mission to Cyprus.

Of particular interest is the material relating to the July - August 1974 Turkish offensives. The Canadian Airborne Regiment, on rotation to Cyprus, was caught in a war between two NATO allies. Beattie's collection includes tape recordings, taken from live radio communications which provide 'up to the minute detail' on the hostilities in Cyprus and illustrate the Canadian military's important role during this vital period.

The second project - to catalogue a backlog of cellulose nitrate negatives - has also retrieved some 'buried treasure'. Many of these negatives were discovered housed, somewhat haphazardly, in drawers and cabinets at Vimy House just prior to our move to the new CWM. With resources finally available to produce prints from the negatives, we discovered images that cover both world wars, the inter war

period, as well as some early images of military training in Canada prior to the First World War. A series of images taken by Arthur Lismer, an official war artist and member of the Group of Seven, was very likely part of the research Lismer completed to ensure accuracy in his well-known painting 'Olympic with Returned Soldiers'. The MHRC catalogued 32 collections during Phase I of this project. As each collection is catalogued, the negatives are packaged following archival standards and moved to cold storage for long-term preservation.

The completion of both projects ensures ease of access to significant research material for CWM staff and researchers.

FCWM Funding will continue this fiscal year to finish the negative cataloguing project - Editor.

CWM WINS NATIONAL AWARD

Afghanistan: A Glimpse of War, a temporary exhibition at the CWM, was awarded the Outstanding Achievement Award in the Exhibitions category by the Canadian Museums Association at their annual meeting in Victoria in April.

The exhibition depicts the

contemporary history of the Canadian Forces in Afghanistan as seen through the lens and in written accounts of two war correspondents.

The exhibit to date has attracted over 180,000 visitors. The exhibit was curated by CWM historian Andrew Burtch.
